It is a matter of great privilege to present the 46th Administrative Report of V.O. Chidambaranar Port Authority (VOCPA) for the financial year 2024–25. This report captures the Port's achievements, strategic progress, and unwavering commitment toward operational excellence, infrastructure growth, environmental sustainability, and technological innovation. It also stands as a testament to the collective effort of our workforce and stakeholders who continue to steer VOCPA toward becoming the "Vibrant Seaport of South India".

#### **Operational and Financial Performance**

The financial year 2024-25 has been one of steady progress and consolidation. VOCPA handled **41.72 million tonnes of cargo**, registering a 0.78% year-on-year growth. Also, the Port's overall financial indicators reflect sustained strength and efficiency.

The Port recorded its highest-ever operating income of ₹1,013.56 crores, with a total income of ₹1,205.71 crores, and maintained an industry-leading Operating Ratio of 28.26%. This outstanding performance demonstrates the Port's robust financial management and its ability to deliver consistent results while pursuing ambitious expansion and modernization plans.

#### **Infrastructure Augmentation and Modernization**

Infrastructure development remains the foundation of VOCPA's growth strategy. The Port continues to enhance capacity, efficiency, and competitiveness through systematic modernization and diversification of assets.

- 3 MLD Desalination Plant using Sea Water Reverse Osmosis ₹67.44 Cr

- Offshore Wind Energy (5 MW) and Tidal Energy (200 KW) pilot projects
- Smart Metering System (O&M for 5 years)
- Upgradation of Street Lighting, Firefighting, AC Systems, and LT Distribution
   Boards within the Port
- Anti-Drone Security System for emergency response and port security

#### Port-Led Industrialization

VOCPA continues to play a key role in promoting port-led industrialization and regional economic growth. Under the Sagarmala Programme, the Port has earmarked 765 acres of land for the development of a Coastal Employment Unit (CEU). During the year 2024–25, 183.39 acres were allotted for setting up Green Hydrogen and Green Ammonia Plants and Edible Oil Refineries, encouraging industrial diversification and employment generation in the Tuticorin region.

#### **Sustainability and Environmental Stewardship**

In alignment with the national agenda of green growth, VOCPA has adopted a **comprehensive Green Port Policy** to integrate sustainability into every aspect of its operations.

#### Major environmental initiatives include:

- Implementation of covered belt conveyor systems, dry fog dust suppression, and highpressure mist fogging to control fugitive emissions.
- Deployment of truck-mounted sweeping and fogging machines for cleaner cargo operations.
- Continuous ambient air and marine water quality monitoring, connected to the TNPCB CARE Air Centre, measuring PM10, PM2.5, SO2, and NOx emissions.
- Hazardous waste management through TNPCB-approved vendors.
- Marine and riparian biodiversity management studies by SDMRI (2018) and Zoological Survey of India (2024).

Through these initiatives, VOCPA continues to uphold its commitment to environmentally responsible operations and sustainable growth.

**Technology and Innovation** 

VOCPA has embraced the digital era with a strong focus on smart port initiatives that

enhance transparency, efficiency, and ease of doing business. Key advancements

include:

• Online berth allocation system for improved vessel turnaround.

RFID-based access control systems for personnel and vehicles.

• Drive-through container scanners and integrated Vessel Traffic Management Systems

(i-VTS) for safe navigation.

• Comprehensive ERP system integrated with cloud-based data platforms for seamless

operational management.

These technology-driven initiatives not only improve productivity but also align the Port

with the vision of "Digital India".

As VOCPA moves forward on its journey of progress, our focus remains steadfast on

strengthening operational excellence, enhancing customer satisfaction, and promoting

sustainable and inclusive growth. The Port is poised to transform into a major

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

## PART - I

# ORIGIN AND DEVELOPMENT OF PORT



#### 1. ORIGIN AND DEVELOPMENT OF PORT AT TUTICORIN

#### 1.1 Introduction

The growth of economy and social improvement of a Nation depends on the development of the Ports in the Country. Ports are the bedrock of the economic development of a Country. They act as a centre for exchange of culture, language and acts as a bridge among the Nations, by facilitating economic cooperation. They also act as an elixir for solving the food scarcity and poverty alleviation. They are the catalysts for growth and facilitates increase in foreign exchange earnings.

#### 1.2 History Of Tuticorin

In Literature, the earliest mention has been made in 88 AD in Greek work "Periuplus of the Erythrean Sea". In AD 124, the earliest reference was made by Ptolemy who has observed 'Country of Kareoi', in the Kolkhic Gulf, where there is a pearl fishery, Sosikourai and Kolkhoi and emporium at the mouth of the river "Solan". There is little doubt that Ptolemy's Sosikuorai is no other place than Tuticorin. From AD 200 to AD 1000, no records pertaining to Tuticorin are available. However, the Tamil Literature of the period, Periyapuranam mention the pearls but ignore the source. James Harnell in his report to the Govt. of Madras has highlighted the Indian Pearl Fisheries of the Gulf of Mannar discussed about Tuticorin. Although in Tamilnadu, there is a mention of Ports like Korkai, Puhar etc. Tamil literature and historical records have highlighted the Pearl Fisheries of Tuticorin and Trading in Pearls. The 7<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> Century AD were ruled by Pandya Kings and 10 to 12 Century AD was ruled by Chola Kings. There is a mention that there was a well guarded and natural Harbour where ships could anchor in safety in Tuticorin. Portuguese, Dutch and British ruled India in different time frame. Portuguese sailed into Tuticorin in 1532. In 1649, Dutch captured Tuticorin. Many European visitors' particularly English travelers have meticulously recorded their impression of Tuticorin in 17th Century. The impression recorded by Philip Baldaeus, an English missionary, who visited Tuticorin in 1675 are graphic and valuable. The lucrative pearl fishery that flourished under the Dutch is vouch safed by Jean De Lacome. The English East India Company took over the administration of Tuticorin and its other dependent cities like Kayalpattinam, Punnakayal, Manapad etc. on the 1<sup>st</sup> June 1825.



#### 1.3 Role Of Tuticorin In India's Independence

Tuticorin become the citadel of freedom struggle in the early years of 20<sup>th</sup> Century. V.O.Chidambaram sowed the seeds of Nationalism and independence with the doctrine of Swadesism and boycott. After undergoing ordeals and struggle, he was able to launch the First Swadeshi Navigation Company in 1907. The Swadeshi vessels S.S.Galia and S.S.Lavo were operated between Tuticorin and Colombo. Launching of Swadeshi ship despite adverse environment was an important milestone in freedom struggle. Patriots like Subramania Siva and Vanchilyer have helped V.O.Chidambaram in spreading the seeds of Indian Freedom to gain independence from the clutches of the colonial rule. Thus, Tuticorin played a significant role in the Independence struggle initiated by Mahatma Gandhiji.

#### 1.4 History Of Tuticorin Old Port

In 1842, a Light House was constructed in Tuticorin. Construction of a Light House was one of the important mile stones for development of Tuticorin Harbour. The planned development of Tuticorin started in 1868. A pier at a cost of Rs.1,200/-was constructed initially. In 1873, Earl Buckingham, during his visit to Tuticorin ordered for strengthening of the pier. In 1887, the 100m pier was doubled. Subsequently, rails were laid to link Tuticorin Port with Railway Station. In 1894, wooden piers were replaced by steel structure. In 1895, reclamation of the area was undertaken at a cost of Rs.2 lakhs and a Port was built. In 1899, the railway lines were extended upto The Pier In Tuticorin Port.

#### 1.5 History Of Tuticorin New Port

The proposal to construct a deep sea harbor at Tuticorin was first thought of in 1914. Though, it was not pursued due to the outbreak of First World War. The first proposal was by Sir Wolfe Lyster Barry and Partners to examine the Prospects of development of the Port. This was followed by Bristow project in 1920 and Palmer Committee Scheme. It was dropped due to financial crisis. In 1924, Tuticorin Port Trust Act was passed by the Madras Legislature. In 1929, Sir Bristow prepared the estimate at Rs.120 lakhs for this scheme and Rs.160 lakhs for Palmer Committee



Scheme. Due to financial constraints again the scheme was abandoned. In 1954, the Govt. of India appointed Chatterjee to examine the development of Tuticorin Port. He gave a proposal at an estimated cost of Rs.4.5 crores. In the meanwhile, a committee was constituted under the Chairmanship of Sir Ramasamy Mudaliar to examine linking up the development of Tuticorin with the feasibility of connecting the Palk Strait with the Gulf of Mannar at a cost of Rs.9.62 crores. In 1958, Tuticorin Port Development Council was constituted consisting of local leaders, business people as members. The committee appraised Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru and Chairman of the Planning Commission as well as Central and State leaders. Pandit Nehru after patient hearing, passed the Tuticorin Harbour Project at a cost of Rs.10.27 crores for 30 ft. Harbour with four alongside berths. Based on that, M/s. Madhurani and Chacko Committee recommended for development of Tuticorin Port. In 1964, Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri in augurated the construction work of New Port. In 1974, oil mooring was installed. In 1975, VOC Berths No. 1 & 2 were commissioned and in December 1976, VOC berths No. 3 & 4 were commissioned. The next important landmark was the integration of the erstwhile anchorage Port and Tuticorin New Harbour into an integrated Port Trust under the Major Port Trusts Act, 1963 w.e.f. 1<sup>st</sup> April, 1979. Subsequently a number of developmental activities took place matching the spectacular increase in the rate of growth of time. The MPA Act, 2021 was implemented from 03.11.2021 and V.O.Chidambaranar Port Trust was converted to V.O.Chidambaranar Port Authority.





#### 3. IMS-INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (QMS, EMS & OHSMS)

V.O.Chidambaranar Port is the First Major Port, having implemented Integrated Management System (IMS) consisting of QMS (ISO: 9001:2015), EMS (ISO 14001:2015) & OHSMS (ISO 45001:2018) during the year 2017.

#### 4. IMS POLICY

We are committed to provide seaport facilities and related support services for sea borne transport facilities by:-

- Ensuring quality service to EXIM Trade, by adhering all legal requirements.
- Protecting the environment tincluding prevention of pollution.
- Ensuring safety by preventing injury and ill health.
- Ensuring commitment of consultation and participation of workers, as well as their involvement where appropriate.
- Continually improving the overall effectiveness of IMS through, employee's motivation and empowerment with social responsibility towards the progress of the Nation.



#### 5. ISPS SECURITY POLICY

V.O.Chidambaranar Port Authority is committed to provide a safe and secure-working environment to all its employees, Port Users, Ships and its personnel. This will be achieved by establishing and maintaining the required security measures (as per the ISPS code) to prevent unlawful acts against people, cargo and marine assets.

#### 6. VTS

The indigenous VTS Software is an initiative under the self-realization vision by the Honourable Prime Minister of India, for building a "Digital India" and using Digital Technologies.

Developing indigenous VTS system that can caterto the needs of the Ports using open architecture for better integration with the existing port operation systems.

Innovative ideas have been implemented in the VOC Port by incorporating two mobile Apps i.e. the "Pilot Thagaval" an app for obtaining the Pilot Card digitally to the Port Operating System and "Sagar Drishti" an app for viewing the Vessel Traffic on mobile / tablets.

#### 7. WORK ENVIRONMENT

The Port Management has provided good work environment like proper ventilation at place of work, drinking water facilities, canteen, toilet, adequate lighting facilities, ambulance, first aid and personal protection equipments for operational Employees and Workers. Equipments safety is ensured by carrying out preventive maintenance promptly. The working area is kept clean. Adequate pollution control measures are taken up.

#### 8. IMPLEMENTATION OF RIGHT TO INFORMATION ACT, 2005

RTI Act is implemented from October, 2005 as per the directions of the Ministry. Appellate Authority, One public Information Officer and one Assistant Public Information officer are appointed to deal with the applications / appeals.



Office of the Public information Officer functions as a Single Window Agency to facilitate general public to obtain information under RTI Act, 2005.

During the year 2024-25, 150/9 applications / appeals have been received and 131/9 applications / appeal have been disposed off.

#### 9. IMPLEMENTATION OF RESERVATION POLICY SALIENT FEATURES

- 1) 15% for SC and 7.5% for ST for Direct Recruitment on All India basis by open competition for Class-I & II posts.
- 2) 15% for SC and 7.5% for ST for promotion in respect of Class I to Class IV posts 27% for OBC for Direct Recruitment on All India basis by Open Competition for Class I to IV posts.
- 3) 19% for SC and 1% for ST for Direct Recruitment on a Local or Regional basis for Tamil Nadu for Class III & IV posts.
- 4) 4% Physically Handicapped -PH
  - a) 1% Visually Handicapped –VH
  - b) 1% Hearing Handicapped –HH
  - c) 1% Orthopedically Handicapped –OH and
  - d) 1 % autism, intellectual disability, specific learning disability and mental illness and multiple disabilities from amongst persons under clauses (a) to (c) including deaf-blindness in the post identified for each disabilities for promotion and Direct Recruitment.
- 5) 10% and 20% for Ex-servicemen in Direct Recruitment in Class- III & IV posts respectively.

As per Regulation 7 of the Tuticorin Port Trust Employees (Recruitment, Seniority and Promotion) Regulations, 2008, orders issued by the Central Government from time to time for the reservation of posts under it, (whether by direct recruitment or promotion) in favour of Scheduled castes and Scheduled tribes, Ex-serviceman, Dependents of those killed in action, Physically handicapped persons and other special categories of persons, will apply mutatis mutandis to all appointments covered by Tuticorin Port Trust Employees (Recruitment,



Seniority and Promotion) Regulations, 2008. In view of the above, orders of the Central Government issued from time to time with regards to reservations are being followed in this Port.

For the precise monitoring of implementation of Reservation policy in V.O.Chidambaranar Port Authority, two Officers at the level of Senior Class I officers belonging to reserved community have been nominated as Liaison Officers, one for SC/ST and another for OBC. The Liaison Officers are periodically inspecting the Registers maintained for the Post based roster points and an officer from the reserved community is included in the committee for filling up of the posts under Direct Recruitments and Departmental Promotions.

Port handled a record 13 windmill blade - carrying ships in May 2024, surpassing the previous highest of 10 ships handled in January 2024.

#### 1. BOARD MEMBERS AND BOARD MEETINGS

From November 2021 V.O. Chidambaranar Port was constituted as V.O.Chidambaranar Port Authority under Chapter II Section 3 (1) of the Major Port Authorities Act, 2021 by the Central Government. The Board consists of Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson and 10 Board Members under Major Port Authorities Act 2021. Board Meetings:- 6 Ordinary Meetings and One Special Meeting of the Board were conducted during the Financial year 2024-25 under the MPA Act 2021.

#### 2. REPORT ON TRAFFIC PERFORMANCE

During the financial year 2024-25, V.O.Chidambaranar Port Authority handled cargo traffic of 41.72 Million tones over the previous year cargo traffic of 41.40 Million tones registering an increase of 0.78%. The Imports accounted for 31.91 Million tonnes registering a decrease of 1.17% compared to the previous year, Exports accounted for 9.70 Million tonnes registering an increase of 8.27% compared to the previous year and bulk Transhipment accounted for 0.12 Million tonnes.












#### 2.7.2 Traffic in Fertilizer from 2020-21 to 2024-25






#### 2.7.3 Traffic in Fertilizer Raw Material from 2020-21 to 2024-25




#### 2.7.5 Traffic in Iron Ore from 2020-21 to 2024-25




# 2.8.1 Average Pre - berthing detention (Port A/c) from 2020-21 to 2024-25


# 2.8.2 Average Turn- round Time (Port A/c) from 2020-21 to 2024-25




# 2.8.3 Average Turn- round Time (Port A/c + Non Port A/c) from 2020-21 to 2024-25 (In Hrs)




# 2.8.4 Average Ship Berth day Output from 2020-21 to 2024-25

**Single day highest (TEUs) in 2024-25:** Highest Single day On 23.01.2025, the ports container terminals handled 5250 TEUs in a Single Day, the highest single day container volume handled during this FY 2024-25.

**NCB II handling:** Port has created a new record by handling 30,789 Tonnes of cargo in a single day on 01.02.2025, surpassing the previous single day cargo handing record of 23,523 Tonnes handled at bulk cargo berth NCB II on 13.09.2024. In the financial year, eight times VOC Port achieved a record of single-day vessel handling at deep draft berth.

**Non Mechanized berth:** Port has created a new record by handling 33,952 Tons of cargo in a single day at non-mechanised bulk cargo on 21.03.2025, surpassing the previous single-day cargo handling record of 32,000 Tons handled at non-mechanized bulk cargo berth on 13.02.2025. 





#### 5. COMMITTEES:-

#### 5.1 Land Allotment Committee:

V.O. Chidambaranar Port Authority constituted the Land Allotment Committee as per the Land Policy for Major Ports -2014. The Committee is headed by the Deputy Chairman, as Chairman of the Committee with Chief Engineer/Estate Officer, Traffic Manager and FA & CAO as members. The Committee examines the requests received from Port Users and Stake Holders and give their recommendations for allotment of Land and related issues and submit to the Competent Authority for approval as per land policy guidelines **Investment Committee** 

5.2 All investment proposals for Board's approval with project cost more than Rs. 10.00 Crores are submitted with the recommendation of standing Committee headed by Chairman and other members of the Committee being Dy. Chairman, Chief Engineer, The Head of the Project and Financial Adviser & Chief Accounts Officer as per Ministry of Shipping letter dt. 11.02.2015 of Delegation of enhanced powers to Major Ports.

#### 5.3 Safety Committee

27 members and 10 Special invitees constitute the Safety Committee. This committee is formed by the Officials of DGFASLI, Port Officials, Heads of vital installation in the Port, BOT operators, Representatives of all the trade unions of Port and Cargo Handling Division, Tuticorin Stevedores Association, Tuticorin Customs Brokers Association, Lorry Owners Association and City Lorry Booking Agents Association are the members in the committee. This Committee meets once in three months. The safety issues related to dock work are deliberated and suitable actions are taken.

#### 8 IMPLEMENTATION OF OFFICIAL LANGUAGE POLICY AND PROGRAMMES

#### 9 PORT SAFETY

There was 04 (four) accidents in the year 2024 - 25. Safety Induction trainings are conducted in regular interval to improve the safety awareness among the employees and Port Users. All kinds of private cargo handling equipments and machineries are inspected before put into operations. Port supplied PPEs to employees including Cargo Handling Division of Traffic Department.

Supply of PPEs to the stevedores are ensured and instructed to wear appropriate PPEs while cargo handling at Port Premises. Two wheelers are strictly advised to wear two wheeler helmets while using Port roads. Port has insured all its critical assets to mitigate various kinds of financial losses port assets arising out of accidents and natural calamities in conformal with the Ministry's guidelines from October 2017 onwards. Total Value of Sum in sure Rs.1 cr.

#### 10 PORT FIRE SERVICE

At present the Port Fire Service has strength of 15 fully trained regular personnel and 65 trained fire fighters (On Contract). They are engaged in various duties like attending Fire and emergency calls. The Port Fire Service operates the Four Fire tenders, each equipped with essential accessories such as Extension ladder, Respiratory System, First aid Box, Portable Fire Extinguishers, Rope & lines, Small Gears, Safety Light, Safety Light, Safety and Rescue Tools, In addition one trailer pumps, three ejector pumps, and two inspection motorbikes are available

#### i) Fire calls and rescue calls :-

During the period 01.04.2024 to 31.03.2025 the Port Fire Service attended 37 Fire calls and 45 Rescue calls within the Port area. Additionally there was one fire call outside the Port area at Threspuram Boat Yard.

#### ii) Mock drill - Fire/ Pollution control measures:-

During the period 01.04.2024 to 31.03.2025, the Port Fire Service conducted 33 Mock Drills, which was attended by Port Employees/ Port Users/ CHD employees/ Port School Teachers & Students/ Coast Guard/ IOCL /SPIC/ DCW/ SHV and other related agencies.



#### iii) Observance of Fire Service Week:-

The National Fire Service week was celebrated in the VOC Port Fire Service for the period from 14/04/2024 to 20/04/2024, with demonstration and lectures class conducted at various location of Port area such as Port Hospital/ South Fire Station/ South Break Water/ Admin Canteen/ Relevant Terminals of SPIC, DCW, IOCL, Kaleesuwari, SHV, Chennai Radha.

### iv) OISD & NSC Audit Closing :-

The OISD Audit Closure Report was prepared and submitted on 27.11.2024 and NSC Audit file has been initiated. The process is currently underway for the "Engagement of IPA Consultant for preparation of Detailed Project Report (DPR) to install the Fire Protection System like Fire Hydrant, Detectors (Smoke & Gas), Manual Call Point, Clean gas fixed fire protection system, Fire detection and Alarm system at VOC Port, Tuticorin".

### 11. PORT MAINTENANCE

The Berths and Jetties, Breakwaters, Railway sidings, Transit sheds, Warehouses, Pipelines, Cargo handling gears, other installations and structures are maintained by the Port Buildings including office complex, residential buildings and road infrastructure facilities are maintained to the required standards. Water supply, drainage and sewerage system, road and plantations in the Port area are also maintained in good condition. The harbour colony including internal roads are also maintained to the required standards.

#### 12. PORT METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATORY

The meteorological parameters recorded at the Port observatory are pressure, temperature, humidity, rainfall, sunshine and wind. All the recorded charts are sent to the Regional Meteorological Centre, Chennai at the beginning of the succeeding month. Two weather messages at 8.30 hrs &



17.30 hrs. are being sent daily to Regional Meteorological Department, Chennai and two other readings are recorded at 11.30 hrs& 14.30 hrs. Meteorological sheets are also sent as weekly statements. One new digital barometer automatic machine is installed to check pressure (Micro Barograph). A modernized Automatic Weather Station (AWS) has been installed by the Meteorological Department at the Observatory premises which records the meteorological parameters and is connected to Regional Meteorological Centre (RMC) Chennai via Satellite.

One Tidal Gauge (PTG) and one Conventional Tide Gauge (CTG) are installed in the Tide Gauge Cabin. The VSAT antenna is installed at the Tide Gauge cabin for the transmission of tidal data to the SOI, Dehradun, on real time basis with GPS data. The tsunami early warning system installed in the Port Tidal observatory transmits the data on real time basis to INCOIS, Hyderabad and Survey India, Dehradun.

#### 13 PORT MEDICAL SERVICES

- 13.1. The Medical Department, VOC Port Authority consists of:
  - i. A **62 bedded** Hospital located in Harbour Estate
  - ii. A **Dispensary** in Zone B.
  - iii. 3 First Aid Centres at (i) VOC Wharf, (ii) Additional Berth, (iii) Zone B
- 13.2. VOCPA Hospital functions round the clock. Port Dispensary functions from 08.00 Am to 12.00 Pm and 05.00 Pm to 07.00 Pm at Zone B.
- 13.3.The beneficiaries who avail medical facilities are Port Employees and dependents, Retired employees and their spouses, CHD employees and their dependants, CHD retirees and spouse, CISF employees and their dependants, and contractual employees engaged through Port.
- 13.4. Employees of other organizations like Tamil Nadu Maritime Academy and employees of Port education agency & Port Canteen avail medical services from Port Authority Hospital on payment basis.



- 13.5. The various sections in Medical Department are i. Registration Room, ii. Casualty, iii. OPD, iv. IPD, v. Operation Theatre, vi. Physiotherapy, vii. Dental Unit, viii. AMRIT Pharmacy, ix. Radiology Unit, x. Clinical Laboratory, xi. AYUSH unit
- 13.6 Both the Hospital and Dispensary are manned by Medical Professionals and Para medical staff. Visiting consultants viz. Orthopedic surgeon, General Surgeon, Pediatrician, General Physician and Obstetrician provide services to the Port beneficiaries. AYUSH unit is functioning with AYUSH doctors by periodical weekly visits.
- 13.7. Major & Minor operations are carried out in Port Hospital.
- 13.8. VOCPA Hospital has empanelled 11 referral Hospitals in Thoothukudi, Tirunelveli, Madurai and Chennai for super specialty services.

#### Clinical Activities:-

The VOCPA Hospital provides comprehensive medical care to its beneficiaries through **Out Patient and In Patient services**. Dental, Laboratory and Physiotherapy services are provided.

All the inpatients are being provided with diet through Port canteen thrice a day. Periodical Medical examination of Port employees & CHD employees are being conducted.



#### First Aid and Ambulance Services:-

Four Ambulances each stationed at Port Hospital, Port Dispensary, Green Gate and Wharf provides round the clock ambulance services.

First Aid is provided to general public for Road Traffic Accidents & other accidents as Trauma Emergency services and shifted to Government Hospital in ambulance if required.

#### 14. WELFARE MEASURES

#### 14.1 Welfare of physical challenged employees:

Order of the Government regarding benefits and concessions to the disabled person in service was extended to the disabled employees. i.e.4% reservation in Group III and IV posts, the total number of person with disabilities appointed as per the reservation is 18. As per WRC settlement 2017 in para No.16.2 all eligible disabled employees are paid transport reimbursement at double the rate.

#### 14.2 Family Security Fund:

The scheme cover all the employees of the port and provides for a lump sum payment of Rs.75,000/- in the case of death and Rs.50,000/- in the case of in capacitation. The subscription rate is fixed at Rs.5/- per month in case of retirees, the entire subscription made by them to the fund is refunded.

#### 14.3 Welfare Schemes:

- 1. As part of welfare measure, V.O.Chidambaranar Port has taken one separate insurance policy with effect from 01.12.2018 by which the family of the deceased employee will get the separate compensation benefits of Rs.5.00 lakhs. These benefits will be extended only to the family of official who dies while in service.
- 2. V.O.Chidambaranar Port has taken another policy tender named unnamed Group Insurance coverage for the Bonafied worker / labours / Visitors entering into restricted area into port from November 2018. Compensation to the extent of Rs.10.00 lakhs in the event of death or permanent disability resulting loss of both limbs and Rs.7.00 lakhs in the event of other permanent disability.



#### 14.4 Educational Institutions:

In order to meet the educational needs of the children of the employees of the port, the following schools are run by the V.O.Chidambaranar Port Educational Agency established by the Port under the Tamil Nadu Recognized Private Schools (Regulation) Rules, 1974.

- 1. J.I.Coilpillai Memorial Harbour Primary School
- 2. J.I.Coilpillai Memorial Harbour Hr.Sec. School
- 3. Dr.B.R.Ambedkar Memorial Harbour Matriculation School

An amount of Rs. 3.60 Crores has been sanctioned as financial assistance to 2024 - 2025 for meeting the expenditure in running the schools over and above the aid grant by the Government of Tamil Nadu.

#### 14.5 V.O.Chidambaranar Port Sports Council:

V.O.Chidambaranar Port Sports Council was formed with the objective of promoting sports and games among the staff of the port. The port is rendering financial assistance of Rs.1.04 Crores to the Port Sports Council to meet various expenditures

#### 14.6 Welfare club:

The Bharathi Nagar Welfare Club looks after the cultural, recreational and welfare needs of the port staff. The club runs a library and a typing institute for the benefits of the staff and children of the port.

#### 14.7 Merit Scholarships:

A scheme for award of merit scholarship for education and lumpsum payment towards cost of book to the meritorious children of the officers and employees has been introduced from the year 1986-87. Merit scholarship is being awarded to the children of employees and officers of the Board for maximum of two children in line with the rules applicable for grant of Children Education Allowance (CEA), from the academic year 2018-19 onwards as per the statement shown below:

To cater the needs of office based staff, working at wharf and residents of the colony area, canteens are run by the committee constituted by the Chairperson. An amount of Rs.49.92 lakhs has been sanctioned for the year 2024-25 to the canteen.

## 14.9 Marriage Advance:

The scheme of Marriage Advance to the employees of the Port has been introduced from the year 1991-92. The advance amount has been enhanced to Rs.3,00,000/- from 01.01.2020 onwards.

## 14.10 Education Advance:

The Education Advance to the Officers/ Employees of the Port for their Children's higher Education are sanctioned and enhanced w.e.f 30.03.2016 for an amount of Rs.3,00,000/- w.e.f.0 1.01.2020.

## 14.11 Medical Benefit for Retired employees:

A financial assistance of Rs. 5.10 crores has been granted as medical reimbursement to the retired employees of Port for the year 2024-25. This is in addition to the cost of out patient's treatment to retired employees.

## 14.12 Assistance to family of employees who die in harness:

Financial assistance of Rs.18,000/- for death has been sanctioned to dependent of the deceased employees of the port to meet out the funeral expenses from 19.01.2021.

## 14.13 Gift Card:

Presentation of memento worth Rs.13,500/- is provided to the retirees on retirement/ resignation/ legal heir drawing family pension on or after 01.01.2017, who have paid contributions to the Family Security Scheme under Family Security Fund of VOC Port.



## 14.14 Swachh Bharat:

As a part of the Special Campaign 4.0, various activities are carried out on Prime Minister Call for Special Campaign 4.0. An action plan has been drawn up for the year 2024 - 2025 and sent to the Ministry & follow up action has been taken. A monthly report on Special Campaign 4.0 has been sent to the Ministry every month.

## **16. PORT SECURITY**

As per the ISPS code, the Deputy Conservator, VOCPA is designated as PFSO, who is responsible for security and involves several critical tasks, including conducting initial security surveys, maintaining a Port facility security plan, performing inspections, enhancing personnel awareness, providing training, reporting incidents, and verifying identities of individual boarding ships.

As per the ISPS code, the Port Facility Security Advisory Committee (PFSAC) meets Half Yearly and provides an advisory role on security matters. However, to review and monitor the Port Facility Security plans and security-related matters, the Port Facility Security Committee (PFSC) meets quarterly with the Port users and departments.

### SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## 1. Basis of preparation of financial statements:

The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention on accrual basis and in accordance with implementation of the revised Standard Norms of Account for Major Ports communicated by erstwhile Ministry of Shipping, Govt. of India, vide letter No. PR-20021/2/98-PG dated 06.11.2002. The accounts has been prepared as per Rule 6 of Major Port Authorities (Audit and Accounts) Rules, 2021 read with Section 44(1) of the Major Port Authorities Act, 2021, notified vide dated:22.11.2021. The said financial statements also comply with the mandatory Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

## 2. Inventories (Accounting Standard-2):

Inventories mainly consist of maintenance spares, tools and consumables and are valued at cost determined on a weighted average basis or net realizable value whichever is less.

## 3. Depreciation (Accounting Standard-6):

Depreciation of fixed assets is provided on straight line method on the economic life of assets given in the directives/circulars issued by the Government of India. Assets capitalized during the year are depreciated as follows:

### Assets put to use

Upto 30 days – Nil

Above 30 days and upto 180 days - Half (50%)
Above 180 days - Full (100%)

Individual assets costing less than ₹ 1,00,000/- and having a life period of less than 5 years are fully charged to Revenue Account.

## 4. Revenue Recognition (Accounting Standard-9):

The major sources of income of the Port are classified as follows:

 Cargo related service charges consisting of wharfage, storage charges, cargo handling and equipment hiring, etc.



- ii. Royalty from PPP operators from IX Berth Container Terminal.
- iii. Revenue share from PPP operations of VIII Berth & Other cargo handling equipment etc.,
- iv. <u>License Fees from PPP operator for the licensing of water front area and back</u> up area.
- v. <u>Port & Dock service charges</u> consisting of towage & mooring and pilotage fees, berth hire fees and port dues.
- vi. Estate Related charges consisting of lease of land, rent, water and electricity and way leave charges.
- vii. <u>Railway earnings</u> consisting of siding charges collected for the use of port siding.
- viii. <u>Finance & Miscellaneous income</u> comprises of interest earned on investments, profit on sale of assets, port entry fees and penalties etc.,
- ix. All charges covered under (i) to (viii) above are recognized on accrual basis immediately on completion of the services except, Penal interest, Interest on advance to Employees, Penalties and Entry Fees which are recognized on receipt basis. Also wherever the claim is disputed for payment and pending as on the Balance Sheet date, the same is being recognized on receipt basis.

## 5. Fixed Assets accounting (Accounting Standard 10):

Fixed assets are stated in the books at historical cost consisting of actual cost of construction/ purchase price including import duties and other taxes which are directly attributable to/bring the asset to the working condition for its intended use. All expenses up to the date of commissioning of the project have been capitalized. Profit or loss on sale of fixed assets is accounted for in the Revenue accounts. Capital work in progress is stated, to the extent of work completed equated to value up to the Balance Sheet date.

## 6. Grants (Accounting Standard 12)

Grants received from Government of India are credited to the Asset Account on completion and net value is shown as Gross Block and depreciation provided thereon. Regarding Grants received in respect of schemes pending execution, the same will be disclosed as Grants received and transferred to Capital account only on completion of assets.

## 7. Investments (Accounting Standard 13):

The Port's investments broadly consist of Fixed Deposit being made with all Nationalized Banks and IDBI Bank till the FY 2023-24. Based on the instructions received from the IPA/Ministry vide letter No.IPA/F&A/Acc./013/Investments of Funds/2023 dated: 07-10-2023, during the FY 2024-25 with the approval of the Board, it has been extended Port's Fixed Deposit with HDFC Bank and ICICI Bank, in addition to the existing Nationalized Banks and IDBI Bank. These investments are recorded at cost (par value).

## 8. Retirement Benefits (Accounting Standard 15):

Actuarial valuation is carried out by LIC of India towards Pension and Gratuity liability in respect of Employees. As per the availability of funds, the required contributions are made to the Pension Fund and Gratuity Fund created for the purpose by charging to revenue account.

Port's contribution to New Pension Scheme is also charged to the Profit and Loss Account. Employees who have joined service in the Port after 1.1.2004 are covered under the New Contributory Pension Scheme. The said Employee's and Employer's contribution is being remitted to NPS Trust through NSDL under the Registration Code of the Port on a monthly basis. As on Balance Sheet date, 94 employees are covered under this scheme.

## 9. Borrowing Cost (Accounting Standard 16):

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition and construction of assets are capitalized till the date on which the asset is commissioned. Interest on loans after capitalization is charged to Revenue account on accrual basis. However, at present Port has not availed any loans.

## 10. Taxes on Income (Accounting Standard 22):

Current tax is the amount of income tax determined to be payable in respect of the taxable income for a period. Deferred tax is recognized, subject to consideration of prudence, on timing differences, being difference between taxable income and accounting income that originate in one period and are enabled for reversal in one or subsequent periods.

## 11. Provisions, Contingent Liabilities & Contingent Assets (Accounting Standard 29):

Provisions are recognized only when there is present obligation as a result of past events and when a reliable estimate of the amount of obligation can be made. Contingent liability is disclosed for (i) Possible obligation which will be confirmed only by future events not wholly within the control of V.O.C Port or (ii) Present obligations arising from past events where it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle, the obligation or a reliable estimate of the amount of the obligation cannot be made.

Regarding amount due, the same is recognized on accrual basis except disputed cases which are either under litigation or under mutual discussions for negotiated settlement with the Port Users/Vendors as well as BOT/PPP operators in which cases, the matter is subjudice.

## 12. Accounting Policies and Format Annual Statements:

The Central Government has made effective the Major Port Authorities Act, 2021 w.e.f 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2021. The Government has also notified Major Port Authorities (Accounts and Audit) Rules, 2021.

As per Section 44(1) of the Major Port Authorities Act, Board will prepare Annual Statement of Accounts in such form as prescribed by Central Government in consultation with Comptroller and Auditor General of India. As per the 195<sup>th</sup> General Body Meeting of IPA held on 31<sup>st</sup> January 2023, the recommendations of the Department Standing Committee(DSC) on Finance and Investments for engagement of The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India(ICAI) Accounting Research Foundation to undertake the work of development of common framework of Annual Accounts of Major Port Authorities under MPA Act 2021 and

Major Port Authorities (Accounts and Audit Rules) 2021, has been approved and accordingly work order dated 17<sup>th</sup> February 2023 has been issued to ICAI.

The ICAI examined the Billimoria Report, present practice(s), Rules and Regulations, Ministry Guidelines being followed at Major Ports while preparing the Annual Accounts and were discussed in the various meetings with the FA&CAO's of all Major Ports and the meeting with Departmental Standing Committee (DSC) from time to time. Based on various discussions, suggestions or inputs, ICAI have submitted their final report dated: 11.09.2024 to IPA and the same has been placed before 208<sup>th</sup> GB meeting of IPA held on 13.11.2024 and resolved that the final report be submitted to MoPSW for onwards submission to the office of Comptroller and Accountants General of India (CAG) for issuance of Notification for implementation of these guidelines in all the Major Ports.

Since the said format is still awaited, the Port has followed the existing accounting policies and format of annual statements which were used by Port prior to 3<sup>rd</sup> November, 2021.

#### b. Actuarial valuation towards Pension as on 31.03.2025:

The actuarial valuation of Pension liability of employees and pensioners as on 31.03.2025 as assessed by M/s LIC of India is ₹ 1947.18 Crores. The pension fund amount of ₹ 1906.62 Crores has already held with M/s LIC of India. The remaining balance of ₹40.56 crores has been recognized as a liability in FY 2024-25.

## c. Actuarial valuation towards Gratuity as on 31.03.2025:

The actuarial valuation of Gratuity liability of employees as on 31.03.2025 as assessed by M/s LIC of India is ₹ 51.30 Crores. The amount of ₹ 46.49 Crores has already held with M/s LIC of India against the said liability under Gratuity Fund. The remaining balance of ₹ 4.81 Crores has been recognized as a liability in FY 2024-25.

## d. Actuarial valuation towards Employees Leave Encashment as on 31.03.2025:

The actuarial valuation of Employees Leave Encashment liability as on 31.03.2025 as assessed by M/s LIC of India is ₹ 22.95 Crores. The Leave Encashment Fund amounting to ₹24.77 crores maintained with M/s LIC of India as on 31.03.2025 has been adequately funded, with an additional margin to cover the related liability.

## e. General Provident Fund

The amounts recovered towards Provident Fund Contribution from the members of General Provident Fund are transferred to Employees General Provident Fund Trust Account formed for this purpose.

## f. Deferred Tax

Consequent to compliance with Accounting Standard – 22 on accounting of taxes on income which has come into effect from the year 2003-04, the effect of net Deferred Tax Liability (DTL) is as below:

## g. Corporate Social Responsibility:

## h. Grant in Aid

No Grant has been received during the financial year 2024-25. However, during the Financial Year 2015-16, the Ministry of Port, Shipping & Waterways had been sanctioned a Grant for Capital Dredging is ₹ 224.01 crores. Out of ₹ 224.01 crores, ₹ 223.65 crores have been released till 31.03.2022 and balance ₹ 0.36 crores is yet to be received from the Ministry.

- i. An amount of ₹ 1,73,26,000/- has been remitted by M/s. Green Star Fertilizer Ltd, Tuticorin (the H1 bidder) for Liquid storage Tank constructed by M/s. Chemplast Tank Farms and as per the order of Hon'ble High Court, the amount remitted has been deposited in Escrow Account with Indian Overseas Bank. As directed by the Court, the amount was subsequently converted into a Fixed Deposit with autorenewal for a period of six months. The matter remains sub judice.
- j. As per the directions of the then Ministry of Shipping, Port has entered into a SPV formed for the purpose of Development of Kanniyakumari Port as M/s. Kanyakumari Port Limited with 40% Share, where M/s Chennai port and M/s Kamarajar Port Erstwhile Ennore Port are also shareholders at 40% and 20% share respectively. Port has made an investment of ₹ 2.00 lakhs as Share Capital.Port has incurred expenditure amount of Rs.28.45 Crores towards various purposes for development of new Port. An amount of Rs.25.11 Crores has been reimbursed by Ministry and amount of Rs.3.34 Crores is yet to be reimbursed from Ministry or M/s Kanniyakumari Port Limited.
- k. Contingent liabilities not provided for in the Books of Accounts, owing to uncertainty in nature and which are disputed, are as follows.
  - The demand from Tamil Nadu Government towards Seignorage Fees
     ₹ 1.18 crores plus interest has not been provided, since it is considered as non-payable & exempted for Port.
  - ii. The cases filed by M/s. Tamilnadu Water Supply & Drainage Board, M/s. Eco Protection Pvt. Ltd., M/s. Flemingo Duty Free Shop, M/s. Jan De Nul Pvt. Ltd., M/s. P. Vetrivel & Dinakaran, etc., has an overall liability and all the cases are pending before various legal forums for disposal. The details of cases filed by and against Port which involves financial implication have been enclosed as **Annexure I**.
  - iii. No provision is considered for disputed Income Tax and Service Tax demands which are under appeal proceedings before various Authorities based on the legal opinions since these demands are not sustainable in law Annexure –II.

- iv. Service related cases are pending before various forum of the Court of Law, challenging appointments, promotion, seniority, MACP, regularization, TA&DA, etc., and in certain cases, Port has been made as Garnishee on the loan obtained by the Port employees which is neither quantifiable nor has major bearing on the revenue /expenditure on the Port account, hence the same is not specifically stated.
- v. The claims of M/s. Dakshin Bharath Gateway Terminal (P) Ltd (DBGT) and VOC Port before the arbitration proceeding are as follows:

The Arbitration Tribunal has rejected the claim of both the parties resulted that the award was partially in favor of Port. Against the ibid arbitration award, DBGT has filed an appeal before the Hon'ble High Court of Madras vide No:OSA (CAD)/57/2022 AND CMP 7599/2022 and the Hon'ble High Court vide its Order dated 22.02.2022 has set aside the arbitration award with the observation that the claim for amendments to the Concession Agreement viz., Reduction of Revenue Share and consequent to change in law, is a live issue and it is open to the Petitioner to institute de novo arbitral proceedings. The said direction has been challenged by the Port before the Division bench of the Hon'ble High Court of Madras.

- vi. In this connection M/s. DBGT has filed a case, vide OSA(CAD)/57/2022 and CMP 7599/2022, with a request to reduce Revenue Share from 55.19% to 45.30% and to extend the date of CoD and Concession Period. In the Hearing held on 26.04.2022, Hon'ble Madras High Court Division (Bench) granted interim stay for the order.Dt .22.02.2022 issued by Hon'ble High Court of Madras. The case was last posted for hearing on 22.10.2024 and adjourned to 19.11.2024. The date of next hearing is not provided by the Court.
- vii. (a) The issue on payment of Royalty as per the License Agreement was challenged by M/s PSA SICAL Terminal Ltd., (PSA SICAL) before the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, which was ordered in favor of Port on 28.07.2021 by setting aside the arbitration award as perverse in nature. In continuation to the ibid Order of the Apex Court, show cause notice was issued for non-adherence to the terms of License Agreement and subsequently Termination Notice was also issued. The issuance of termination notice was challenged at Hon'ble Supreme Court through Writ Jurisdiction and the matter is under subjudice.
  - Consequent to the Order dt.7.6.2022 passed by Hon'ble High Court of Madras in (b) WA No.227 & 229 of 2022, in connection case filed by PSA Sical Terminal limited against The Board of Members of VOC Port, VOC Port enchased the Bank Guarantee furnished by PSA SICAL, for an amount of ₹ 62,01,90,000/against the Royalty dues for the period from 15.7.2011 to 28.2.2019. Subsequently PSA SICAL, filed an application against the encashment of Bank Guarantee and Arbitral Tribunal vide order dt.2.8.2022 directed VOC Port to deposit the sum of ₹ 62,01,90,000/- in a form of Fixed deposit in the name of VOC Port. Accordingly, VOCPA deposited the amount of ₹ 62,01,90,000/- in FD at Canara Bank. The originals of FD receipts were handed over to the Presiding Arbitrator to be retained in his custody until further orders. The Final Award for the Arbitration was issued on 07.07.2023, wherein it was directed that sum of ₹ 62,01,90,000/- shall continue to be retained in the bank for period of 3 months from the date of maturity of FD. However, Port has filed appeal before the District Court seeking three interim reliefs, one of which is to grant an interim

direction permitting the petitioner (VOCPA) to appropriate the sum of ₹.62,01,90,000/-(Rupees Sixty two crores one lakh and ninety thousand only) deposited by the petitioner herein with the bank in terms of the orders of the Arbitral Tribunal dated 02.08.2022. Hearings were held on 23.11.2023, 14.12.2023 & 8.1.2024. Judge on transfer. Hence case reopened by the court for the arguments by 19.06.2024. Hearing was held on 10.7.2024 through Virtual mode before the New Judge for the interim application of appropriate the sum of Rs.62,01, 90,000/-(Rupees Sixty two crores one lakh and ninety thousand only).

The Hon'ble District court vide order dt. 26.7.2024 dismissed the above application. The case was listed for hearing on 21.10.2024 for hearing the main appeal. However, the judge got transferred and the case was listed for hearing on 22.3.2025, Port side arguments completed. The case was listed for hearing on 17.04.2025, for PSA SICAL arguments, since Judge was not available in the Post lunch session the hearing is posted on 21.6.2025.

(c) In addition to the above, PSA SICAL has also filed appeals at various legal authorities (Annexure – III) and in one of the cases, as per the Arbitral Tribunal award dated: 02.11.2019, PSA SICAL has paid the Royalty @ ₹ 1.50 Crores per month. Hence, Port has been accounted the royalty payment @ ₹ 1.50 crores per month in compliance to the Order of Arbitral Tribunal, though royalty payable as per agreement is different. However, final award was passed on 07.07.2023, wherein the claims of the port were rejected and directed that payment made by PSA SICAL be operative only for a period of three months from date of final award. Hence, M/s. PSA Sical not paid the Royalty @ ₹ 1.50 Crores after 3 months period. i.e., from October, 2023 onwards. VOCPA filed appeal in the District Court against the award in Ar. OP 396/2023 to grant stay of final award and claim Bank Guarantee amounting to ₹ 62,01,90,000/-(Rupees Sixty two crores one lakh and ninety thousand only) along with royalty charges. The matter is posted for hearing on 21.6.2025.

- (d) M/s PSA SICAL filed an Interim Application dated 27.06.2024 stating its intention to surrender the premises and requested directions for a condition survey. During the hearing held on 30.08.2024, M/s PSA SICAL expressed willingness to voluntarily hand over Berth No. 7 to the Port, and the Port agreed to take it over both sides reserving their legal rights. On 09.09.2024, a joint memorandum was submitted before the Arbitral Tribunal, confirming PSA's readiness to hand over the berth and the Port's agreement to take it over. The Port formally took over the container terminal from PSA SICAL on 28.02.2025, without prejudice to the legal claims of VOCPA. The disputed royalty amounts are currently under judicial consideration and pending before the courts. Further the same will be decided on the final verdict of arbitration.
- I. Amounts not considered in Books of Accounts as income due to its uncertainty in nature. The details are as follows:
  - i. Port has entered agreements with various firms on several kinds of project. In that, some firms have approached various legal forums on the issues like encashment of Bank Guarantee; deduction of Liquidated Damages & TDS; claim on differential amount; royalty charges, etc. The amount involved in the same cannot be included in the book of accounts as it is disputed and uncertain in nature. Such cases details are enclosed as **Annexure IV.**
  - ii. The License Fee / Lease rental income receivable which are disputed due to court cases being subjudice are not accounted as income in books of accounts. Similarly, the MGT dues of those parties for which the agreement has not been executed and disputed has not been accounted owing to its uncertainty.
  - iii. Following the merger of CHD with the Port on 01.01.2000, the EPF scheme was replaced by the GPF scheme. Although EPF accounts were officially closed only on 18.12.2002 upon receiving an exemption under the EPF & MP Act, 1952, a legal dispute arose regarding the delayed transfer of GPF balances, including applicable interest for former TPT CHLP subscribers.

In compliance with the Madras High Court's order dated 16.03.2012, the Employees' Provident Fund Organization (EPFO) has applied simple interest under Section 7(Q) of the Act. The outstanding balances receivable from the EPFO comprise both EPF & Pension Fund contributions, along with associated interest and the same is detailed as follows:

\*A dispute exists regarding the applicable period for interest calculation: the Port asserts that interest should accrue from 01.01.2000, the date the GPF scheme replaced the EPF following the merger, whereas the EPFO argues that interest liability begins only from 18.12.2002, the official date of EPF account closure. The total outstanding amount receivable from EPFO as of 31.03.2025 is ₹3,78,29,359. In this connection, the remainders are also sent to RFPC, Tirunelveli on 22.02.2024 and 07.05.2024.

m. Physical Verification of Fixed Assets will be done Quinquennielly and the last verification completed and report submitted in the FY 2023-24. Further, Physical verification of Investments, Inventories and Tools & Plants are being done annually.

- n. Wherever considered necessary, the figures have been re-grouped/ rearranged for comparison / presentation purposes including previous year figures.
- o. The Port experienced unpreedent heavy rainfall and flood in December 2023. The Port properties available outside the Port having assessed value of ₹28.23 Crores and assets inside the Port having assessed value of ₹15.81 Crores totalling ₹44.04 Crores have been damaged and claim made before M/s. New India Assurance Co., Necessary survey by insurance company was completed and the doucments sought for by the Insurer in this connection have already been submitted. The claim settlement process is currently underway with M/s. New India Assurance Co. The exact amount receivable will be determined upon final settlement. As part of the ongoing claim process, the Port has received an interim payment of Rs. 1.50 Crores from M/s. New India Assurance Company Ltd.
- p. The Fixed Asset Register of VOC Port does not currently include the unsurveyed land held by the Port as of 31st March, 2025, as the process of survey number allotment by the State Government is still ongoing. Upon completion and formal allotment of survey numbers by the State Government, the full extent of the land will be incorporated into the Fixed Asset Register.

We have audited the financial statements of V.O. Chidambaranar Port Authority, Which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2025 and the Income & Expenditure Account/Receipts & Payment Account for the year ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 44 of the Major Port Authorities Act, 2021. These financial statements include the accounts of units/branches of the V.O. Chidambaranar Port Authority.

## Separate Audit Report on the Accounts of V.O. Chidambaranar Port Authority for the year ended 31 March 2025

#### A. Balance Sheet

1. Sources of Funds

Reserves and Surplus

Revenue Reserve: ₹1,135.74 crore

The above includes ₹1.01 crore being the profit on sale of capital assets (TUG Thiruvalluvar 32 TBP), which was to be transferred to capital reserve.

#### 2. Application of Funds

**Current Liabilities Provisions** 

Current Liabilities - ₹643.03 crore

Provisions - ₹470.01 crore

i) Above does not include an amount of ₹9.06 crore being the amount agreed by Port towards the compensation claim of ₹62.88 crore by M/s. Chennai Radha Engineering Works Pvt. Ltd. (CREW) for the pre-closure of contract for "Mechanisation of the cargo evacuation". Further the contingent liability for remaining amount of ₹53.82 crore was not disclosed in the Notes to Account.

This has resulted in understatement of current liabilities, provisions and overstatement of profit to extent of ₹9.57 crore.

#### 3. Application of Funds

Fixed Capital Assets – Net Block (Schedule 3) Capital Work in Progress - ₹116.98 crore

As per the Significant accounting policy no. 5, the extent of work completed upto the Balance sheet date is only considered for capital work in progress. This includes ₹1.81 crore (20 per cent Advance amount: ₹ 33.40 lakh and balance 80 per cent amount: ₹ 1.48 crore) being amount sanctioned for procurement and supply of spares and equipment for the development of indigenous VTS software system.

As on date, VOC Port Authority had paid 20 *per cent* of sanctioned amount i.e. ₹ 33.40 lakh. However, company created liability for the balance 80 *per cent* amount of ₹ 1.48 crore also and included in CWIP. This has resulted in overstatement of CWIP and current liability by ₹ 1.48 crore.

#### 4. Application of Funds

Fixed Capital Assets - Net Block (Schedule 3)

Capital Work in Progress - ₹116.98 crore

Above is overstated by an amount of ₹12.01 crore being the expenditure incurred for the six capital works. Since the works have been completed as on balance sheet date & put to use for intended purpose and the same was also certified by the contractor, the amount incurred should be capitalised under Fixed assets. Thus, non-capitalisation of the above completed work has resulted in understatement of Fixed assets by ₹12.01 crore and overstatement of Capital work in progress. This has also resulted in corresponding understatement of depreciation by ₹1.01 crore with corresponding overstatement of Surplus for the year.

# 5. Application of Funds Investments – (Schedule 4) General Reserve Share, Debentures or Bonds – ₹90.71 crore

Above includes ₹50 crore towards equity contribution to Sethu Samudram Corporation Limited during 2005-06 to 2008-09. The project could not make any progress since the main work was stopped in 2007-08 on the order of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India (14.09.2007). Since then, the corporation has not commenced commercial operation and hence investment may be impaired. Considering the non-viability of the project, other PSUs like Vizakapatnam Port Trust, Shipping Corporation of India, Dredging Corporation of India and Kamarajar Port Ltd have already made provision against their respective investment in Sethu Samudram Corporation Limited, but VOCPT did not do so.

The issue was already pointed out in SARs 2021-22 to 2023-24 wherein it was assured that "action will be taken on receipt of communication from Ministry". However, no action was seen taken to obtain any such clarification from the Ministry.

Hence, non-provision against the above investment by VOC Port Authority resulted in understatement of Provisions by ₹50 crore and corresponding overstatement of Net Surplus before Tax.

#### B. | Profit & Loss Account/Income and Expenditure Account

#### 1. Cargo Handling & Storage Charges: ₹553.54 crore

As per the Significant Accounting Policy (No. 4) of VOC Port authority on Revenue Recognition, the cargo related service charges consisting of wharfage, storage charges etc. are recognised on accrual basis immediately on completion of the service. However, the wharfage income booked on 31 March 2025 includes wharfage income of ₹1.19 crore towards the cargo discharge commenced before 31 March 2025 but completed on or after 1 April 2025. The said wharfage income was accounted in 2024-25 instead of in April 2025. This has resulted in overstatement of income and surplus for the year 2024-25 by ₹1.19 crore.

The Physical verification of Assets in VOC Port Authority is being done Quinquennially and last verification was done in the FY 2023-24. The Policy for the Physical Verification of Fixed Assets has been framed and disclosed vide para no. (m) of the Note to Accounts of the Annual Statement of Accounts.

#### (iv) System of Physical verification of inventory

The Physical Verification of Inventories in VOC Port Authority has been carried out during 2024-25.

#### (v) Regularity in payment of statutory dues

VOCPA has been regular in payment of Statutory dues, all statutory dues during the period 2024-25 were paid to the concerned authorities.

#### (vi) Other matters relating to the functioning of the entity - Nil

The Labour Pool of cargo handling workers (including Shore Labourers) was managed and administered by Tuticorin Stevedores Association (TSA) from 1981 to 1999. From 01-01-2000 onwards the Labour Pool (including Shore Workers) is managed and administered by the V.O.Chidambaranar Port Authority Cargo Handling Labour Pool (TPTCHLP). The cargo handling workers in the Port were Merged with the Port by forming a Cargo Handling Division(CHD) under the control of Traffic Department with effect from 27.07.2011. The combined statement of Dock/Shore Labour Productivity is available in Table No 18.
